


Our School & Team










We are proud to be a Catholic school under the patronage of the Archbishop of Dublin, but we are a truly inclusive school welcoming children of all faiths and none where all children are cherished with the dignity and respect they deserve. Our School Chaplain is Fr. Pat Reilly. p.p

Our school is modern and boasts a range of up to date facilities. Our classrooms are bright, modern purpose-built classrooms which allow for the provision of a whole, well balanced, child-centered curriculum. All classrooms are equipped with state of the art interactive whiteboards. Our classes can also boast access to class sets of Ipads and tablets. Our Learning support and resource rooms are equipped to accommodate all learning needs, whilst our sensory room provides children with more complex needs, a safe and calming environment.

We offer lots of after school clubs which compliment our holistic approach to your son's education. We are fortunate to have a highly qualified Speech and Drama teacher on our staff, who teaches mixed-age classes after school for boys and girls.. We have 2 GAA football teams which participate in the Fingal League and Cumann na mBunscoil League. French club, Speech & Drama, Eco Club are also very popular with the boys in our school. You will find more details about each club on our school website.

We are an all boys school with 16 classes from Junior Infants to 6th class. Our school staff comprises of experienced class teachers, special education teachers and special needs assistants. Our school also has full time secretarial staff and a caretaker. Our school is under the leadership of a full-time dedicated Principal Brian Horan and Deputy Principal Anthony Manning.



Structures in our School

Board of Management:

A board of management is elected every 4 years and is composed of representatives of our Patron, parents & teachers. Our board meets regularly under the guidance of its chairperson Mrs. Mary Brooks.

Parents' Council:

Our school has a very supportive parents' council, which plays an integral role in our school. At the beginning of each academic year there is an AGM of the Parents' Council. This is advertised so look out and come to this if possible. As a member you can play a silent or an active role. If you're not into "committees", you can simply be at the end of a phone line when we need extra help. The Principal, Brian Horan, a member of the school Board of Management and those who have become involved as parents attend the Parent's Council monthly meeting. Our Chairperson for the Parent's Council is Karen Dunne.

Being on the Parents' Council is a great way of getting to know the Principal, the teachers and indeed a bit more about the school, its programmes and projects. Being a member is not just enjoyable, it gives you a reassurance and confidence in the school that's educating your child.



School Council: Every class in our school has two elected representatives to the School Council. Elections are held early in the year and interested candidates are encouraged to make posters, and address their class with speeches.



The goal of our Council is to give the pupils a voice. So far, they have come up with ideas such as Buddy Benches for our yards, a Multicultural Day to help everyone feel included and most recently the Council decided to start a school newsletter, written by the pupils for our school community. It is published online every month and linked on our website.



Green School Committee: In our school we have a Green Schools Committee made up of Children and staff from Junior Infants-6th class. A new committee is elected yearly. Getting ready for reading!

In Junior and Senior Infants, we use the Jolly Phonics programme to teach the sounds and skills needed for reading. This programme has an emphasis on teaching the letter sounds in a fun, interactive way. A Junior Infant Parent Information Meeting will be held in the first term, you will get lots of information about Jolly Phonics at this meeting, with an opportunity to ask questions. We recommend not pre-teaching any letters or sounds before your son starts school, but there are lots of pre-reading activities you can do at home to help develop yours sons phonological awareness and prepare him for his exciting journey of learning to read!

Here are some ideas for at home which you may find helpful!

Read to your son regularly at home-books, cereal boxes, menus- the more varied the better!

When reading books, chat and ask your son questions...who, what, when, where?

Say some nursery rhymes and poems together, can you spot the rhyming word?

Sing, Sing, Sing! Lots of Oral language development is helpful! clap syllables in words e.g. ban-an-a




Listening skills are an important skill, have your son sit and listen to a short story, or have him follow a list of chores at home to complete!

Allow your son to 'read' and explore reading materials independently at home

Play some listening games like Simon Says and I spy



Show them the right way! It is normal for young children to mispronounce words, don't correct them, instead model the word correctly in a sentence for them.





Getting ready for formal writing!




Here in St. Patrick's BNS, we will teach your child to write using a cursive (joined) script from the beginning. Learning cursive handwriting from Junior Infants has many benefits including greater fluency in reading, less reversals of letters, as well as making spellings easier to learn. Our Junior Infant Parent meeting in term 1 will explain this further. We recommend that you don't try to teach your son any formal writing at home as cursive fonts can differ which may confuse your son. Instead there are lots of meaningful and beneficial activities you can do at home to prepare your son for his writing journey. By focusing on fine motor skills development, you are giving your son a great start in his handwriting journey!

What are Fine Motor Skills & why are they important?

A child's fine motor skills determines their ability to precisely control smaller muscles in their hands, thumbs and fingers. These skills provide the coordination needed for many daily tasks such as buttoning clothes, eating, cutting, drawing and of course successfully being able to write!






Supporting Fine Motor Development at home

Aistear





Aistear is a word you can expect your son to begin using when he starts school. He may already be familiar with it from his pre school setting, expect to hear this word lots over the next two years!

So what is Aistear?

Aistear is the curriculum framework for children from birth to six years. It provides information for adults to help them plan for and provide enjoyable and challenging learning experiences, so that all children can grow and develop as



competent and confident learners. Aistear describes the types of learning that is important for children in their early years, and offers ideas and suggestions as to how this learning might be nurtured.

How is aistear implemented in St. Patrick's Boys School?

The aistear framework is implemented in both Junior and Senior Infants. We use a thematic approach to our teaching. A new theme is explored each month which links to many curricular areas. Children also explore the current theme through explicit 'play' stations each day. The stations used are socio-dramatic play, creative play, constructive play, small world play and sensory play.

How can Aistear help me as a parent?

There are lots of great examples, exciting ideas, and practical suggestions in Aistear to help you as a parent. For example, the Framework suggests lots of things you can do to help your child learn through everyday activities and routines, such as getting food ready for meals, going to the shops, and checking the post. Aistear shows how important play is for your child's learning and development, and gives ideas for ways you and your child can play and learn together.

Preparing for school

Parents and guardians can do a lot to help prepare their son for their first day of 'big school'. It is such an exciting time and it can be beneficial for children to have time to practice some of the following things before the big day arrives!

Recognise their name:

We recommend that you label your son's belongings (coat, scarf, jumper etc), these things can be easily mixed up! It would be helpful if your son can recognise his own first name for this reason, it will give him a sense of independence too!

Getting dressed:

Try on the school uniform/ tracksuit in advance. Your son may need some practice putting on/ off his jumper and coat for yard. Velcro shoes rather than laces are preferable. School trousers sometimes have tricky clasps for small hands! Practice opening and closing these at home for toileting purposes. Encourage your son to begin doing this for himself at home in preparation for school.

Lunch Time:

Starting Junior Infants is very exciting and is a chance for your son to become more independent and confident. Encourage him to become familiar with opening and closing his school bag, lunchbox and bottle.



Effective hand washing is a continued priority in our school. Show your son steps to washing his hands independently and chat about why it is important.






Preparing for School

School-A positive start

Starting Junior Infants is a big step in your life and the life of your son. As exciting as it can be, it can be an anxious time too. Here are some suggestions which may help the transition to school be a calm, enjoyable experience.



Routine:

Discuss the routines to be expected with your son.

A predictable, familiar routine is a great start to the day! Talk about who will drop them to school/ collect them? How will you travel to/ from school? What is their teachers name? Explain that you will have to leave, and what they can do if they feel a little sad, you will find some tips to help with this below:

Stay connected during the school day:

A note/picture in their lunchbox, a morning joke, a special drop off routine, matching bracelets!

Hug Button:

Draw a heart on your hand and a heart on your sons hand. This way, throughout the day, when you miss each other 'press' your heart to send a hug to each other using your hug button!



Worry Stone

This can be a small pebble from the garden! Your son can rub this stone and 'rub' his worries away!

Breathing techniques:

'Bubble Breathing' and 'Rainbow breathing' are super techniques to help with anxiety. Youtube provides lots of guided breathing videos for children. Perhaps practice some of these at home in advance of the big day!
